CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

This college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University (old Pune University). The curriculum for all the courses is designed by the board of studies of the university. The members of the board of studies of all the faculty meet every three years and revise the syllabus. Except some autonomous branches, all the colleges affiliated to the university have strictly to follow the curriculum with compulsory and optional subjects in the respective curriculum. The members of the board of the studies publish the books related to the syllabus and suggest reference books for the same. This college has well planned mechanism to implement the curriculum. There are four main branches continuously implementing the prescribed curriculum. They are Arts, Commerce, Science and Computer science. These four branches have been classified into fifteen faculties/departments. Art branch includes languages like English and Marathi as well as social sciences like Political science, History, Defence Studies, Geography and Economics. Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Mathematics are the faculty working under Science branch. Commerce and Computer Science are the separate faculties delivering curriculum designed by the university. With the help of spacious classrooms, classrooms equipped with ICT tools, smart boards, language lab, seminar hall, laboratories and power point, the college has well planned mechanism for the delivery of the curriculum. Various workshops as well as certificate and diploma courses have been conducted for enhancing the professional and life skills of the students. Seminars and conferences are organized to strengthen the knowledge of the teachers and the students. The continuous assessment of the students and documentation of the curriculum are followed concisely by all the teachers. Teachers' daily teaching diaries are written and duly signed by the HODs. Term End examination is conducted in the first half of the academic year. The CAP (Centralized Assessment programme) is organized to assess the answer books. Mark lists are prepared and the marks of each subject are filled online on the website provided by the Examination Department of the University. All the science faculty follow the semester pattern determined by the university along with internal and external examinations. The documents related to curriculum, changes in the syllabus, syllabus revised, examination pattern, etc., are filed in the concerned departments. The well-equipped department of Examination of the college keep the documentation related to Examination. The tutorials, home assignments, project works are assigned to the students continuously and are collected by the concerned departments. The teachers of the concerned department assess them and are kept filed in the departments. The old question papers are preserved for the guideline for the future students. Each department is well-equipped with computers, printers and Internet facility. The Internet resources are used to download the syllabus and important circulars related to

the curriculum and examination. The students are allowed to use departmental rooms and computers with the permission of the HOD. The students are taught by using the computers. Online lectures are conducted in the concerned departments frequently.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained
<p>Till the previous year, the feedback from all above sectors were being obtained at the end of the academic year through questionnaire printed on the forms. From this year, the college has started to obtain feedback online. The common policy has been adopted for receiving feedback from the various sectors related to the college. A separate website has been designed by the college to get feedback easily. For each sector, a separate online feedback form is designed to facilitate their responses. gmdcollege69@gmail.com is the authorized website for the feedback. The feedback system has been made a continuous process from this year. Four types of feedback forms have been designed by the college. The first is Students' Evaluation on Teacher. The students, who note their response, have to mention firstly their information including name, CRN Number, branch, department and the name of the teacher whose feedback they note. Some points related to the teachers' overall performance and teaching aptitude are made and responses in the form of remarks like poor, fair, satisfactory, good etc. are obtained online. The average remarks determine the teachers' current performance in the college. Secondly, we have designed a form for teachers' feedback on the current syllabus. The teachers have to fill the information regarding his/her name, department, subject, email address etc. the feedback about the role of concerned teachers on curriculum designing, syllabus accuracy, completion of the syllabus, research possibilities in the prescribed syllabus, usefulness of the prescribed texts etc. are obtained through this feedback. The analysed information help the teachers to recommend the improvement in the current syllabus to the board of editors of the university. Thirdly, the most significant system of feedback from alumni has been designed by our college. With the help of this system we receive alumni's information regarding his current position, his/her additional education after leaving this college, awards and recognition received in one's professional career and his/her association with the college. The questionnaire is provided on the online form including the knowledge the alumni has gained during his/her college years, their views on college administration, playground, infrastructures, teachinglearning process etc. The fourth form has been designed for the parents' feedback on the syllabus. The focus is given on the wards' academic and professional necessity. The complaints given by wards are considered through the feedback by the parents about the syllabus. The questionnaire has been provided including the issues like scope and limitations of the syllabus, contents, the need of syllabus revision, relevance of the syllabus to the wards' life skills, and future job opportunity after completion</p>

of degree course and feedback is obtained through yes/no response by the parents. The system of analysis of the feedback is well planned on the website. The data is collected in the excel form and analysis is automatically done in the form of tables, graphs, and pie charts. The analysed information is notified for the perusal of the teacher after the end of the academic year and are recommended to improve their skills thereby.

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2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Yes, the college is actively undertaking mentormentee system, whereby a mentor was provided to every student to look after his/her academic and psychological well being and also monitor class attendance and performance. Under the Mentor system, the fulltime teachers of the college have been engaged as mentors of each class. Students of each class in the college are having a full time teacher as their mentor. The classes, where there are huge numbers of students, have been assigned more than one mentor. At the beginning of the academic session, the classwise names of the mentors are displayed on the college notice board. Apart from this formal mentormentee system, the individual departments recognize differential requirements of students and try to fulfill their needs by way of presentation competitions, class assignments, home assignments, class tests, google classroom, etc. Departments help students to improve in learning by conducting tests MCQ based, written unit tests, oral exams, online assignments through google classroom for multiple times. Students are encouraged for group discussions on syllabus related topic for gaining the knowledge from others. Students are encouraged for participation in various poster competitions, workshops, quiz, seminars, social activities, campaigns organized by NSS department so as to expose them with new horizon of knowledge. Students are taken for industrial visits, field survey where they interact with the eminent scientists / socialist and discuss queries. Department organizes guest lecture on regular basis, so that student interacts with faculty from other institutes / industry. Students are encourage to participate in various competitions, sport events and undertake projects wherever possible. Students are motivated to participate in programs like soft skill development, skill development, personality development workshops, etc. Faculty members of PG departments encourage the advanced learner to take participation in various examinations like NET, SET, GATE, etc. The mentors use both formal and informal means of mentoring. The mentor system, apart from its formal part, also exists as a robust informal mechanism to boost inclusiveness, science awareness, health consciousness, gender sensitivity and social responsibility of students.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college has constituted examination committee to bring transparency in the examination process and facilitate the students to enhance their performance.

Time to time examination department provides guidance to other academic departments for conduct of internal evaluation examinations / activities. As a part of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) each department undertakes class test, and internal examination before the commencement of University semester examination. Apart from internal examination, Departments also measures the academic progress of the students through presentation (PPT), group discussions home assignments, project making, online tests/assignments, and class tests. Evaluation and result analysis helps teachers to analyze student progress in specific subject. Students are informed in advance for internal assessment patterns like written examination, assignments, and seminar. The department's displays time table for the same on notice boards time to time. Students are free to ask their queries regarding assessment done and discuss their difficulties they face during study. Online assignments and unit test activity in conducted by many departments with the aid of google classroom. Individual Departments as per the convenience, organizes Parents Teachers meet to convey the progress of wards to their parents. Online academic feedback system helps us determine the appropriateness of syllabus to students.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The IQAC department of college prepares the academic calendar at the beginning of the academic year and display it on the website and the notice board before the admission process begins every year. Individual departments also prepare their own academic calendars and display it on respective department's notice board for students. In academic calendar of institute and departments major focus is given to teaching learning plan, internal examination, unit test, sports activities, guest lectures, parent teacher meets, alumni meets, departmental academic events, seminars, workshops, counseling, extension series and industry interaction etc., For examination, the college strictly follows the Academic Calendar provided by the Savitribai Phule Pune University. The dates of internal assessment tests are announced, well in advance by bringing out notices for students. The Schedule dates of Filling examination forms and the actual University examinations (Theory Practical) are announced to the

students by displaying the notices/circulars issued by University on student's notice board. The tentative dates of activities of NSS, NCC, College social and other cultural programs and placement cell are also given in the academic calendar. The academic calendar helps keep a track on the functioning of the departments. This facilitates the extra initiatives that need to be taken for the future improvisations.

The physical facilities including Laboratories, Classrooms and Computers are made available for the students. Funds are allotted for maintenance of the laboratories and the classrooms which are a part of the teaching and the learning process. The maintenance and the cleaning of the classrooms and the laboratories are done with the efforts of regular staffs of the institute and with support service from outside. The College ensures maximum utilization of facilities such as classrooms by framing a time table, displaying it onto the notice board where time slots for each class are allotted before the commencement of semester. Classrooms are cleaned daily by non teaching staff of the concern departments. The college also gets the wash rooms and common rooms cleaned on daily basis. The college garden is maintained by the gardener appointed by the institute. The college has adequate number of the computers with internet connections and they are maintained by Experts Personnel with whom the AMC have been signed. The Language Lab, photocopy Machines, Computers systems and Software are maintained with AMC of the corresponding service provider. Electrical and the plumbing related maintenance is done with the help of Institute appointed skilled personnel and the expenditure is done from yearly allotted budget approved by CDC. Standard safety procedures are followed for handling chemicals, acids and various other equipments. Regular cleaning and maintaining of equipments is done by the lab assistants. The College ensures effective utilization and maintenance of library through library committee. Books are issued to the students on their issue cards and I cards. Fine is charged for overdue books. The library remains open for 8 hours on all working days. During examination period, the reading room is open from 7.00 am to 6.00 pm. The college provides quarters for staff in the campus and a Girls Hostel. The college has spacious individual playgrounds for indoor and outdoor games. The sports infrastructure is been used by the students who are interested in taking part in sports. Gymnasium has weight lifting, power lifting sets and multistation weight training machinery. Maintenance of equipments is done from Gymkhana fees.

Teachers conduct student seminars to foster the greater student Interaction. College gives access to many online journals and books through the Infflibnet platform. Interactive sessions, Group discussions, Movie based teaching are used by social science and Arts faculty members. Academic and extracurricular activities are organized to give the platform to develop the overall personality of the students and to monitor them continuously.

Examination and Evaluation

The College follows examination and evaluation system prescribed by the Savitribai Phule University, Pune for traditional and Credit based system. The college has set up the examination committee to keep an eye on the whole examination process and to make effective implementation of the evaluation reforms initiated by the college. The Examination Committee oversees the smooth conduct of the examinations. Conducting unit test, internal examination, practice practical examination are scheduled by examination committee. The committee prepares the schedule of the term end exams and is circulated in each class at least 1015 days' prior of the exams. The same is also displayed on the notice board and college website. University time Table of each course is displayed on the notice board at least two week before the exam commences. Strict invigilation is followed during the exams. The examination committee ensures the internal and term end papers are aptly checked and distributed to the students and difficulties of the students are solved.

Research and Development

The college has Research Committee to monitor and address the issue of research. Institute provides research labs with basic research facilities for teachers and students. Staff members are encouraged to pursue M. Phil and Ph.D. degrees. INFLIBNET facility is provided to all. The faculties have been recommended to send their proposals for minor and major research

projects to the various funding agencies. The college organizes various state / National level conferences to develop research atmosphere. Faculties are encouraged to present paper in national and international conferences, seminars and symposia by providing TA and registration fees. The faculty members are encourage to published their research papers in UGC listed National and International journals only.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The college library is well developed and maintained. Library is enhanced by making ePG pathshala, eShodhsindhu, shodhganga access available for all students. The college subscribed INFLIBNET and access is given to faculty members and selected students. The college has well established classrooms, seminar halls and practical labs. Classroom with projector and smart board are made available for exploration of ICT based teaching learning process. Internet with 100 MBPS speed is provided for browsing. The college has gymnasium playground for all the students of the campus.

Human Resource Management

The appointments of all staff is done as per the norms of the Govt. of Maharashtra, UGC, Savitribai Phule Pune university and parent institution (MVP Samaj, Nashik). The appointments of the teachers are strictly on the basis of merit. The newly appointed teachers are gradually assigned various committees and responsibilities. In order to stay updated and learn new skills staff members took part in Refresher, Orientation programmes, Short Term Course, online programmes etc. Performance appraisal system is practiced by college. The college campus has a water reservoir which is very beneficial and plays an important role in the water management of campus. It was dug to obtain the stone pieces for the construction of the spacious building of the college. This has become the natural source for the water. It is around 20 feet deep and 4500 sq ft in width. The water conserved in that reservoir is useful to plant more trees and to conserve the existing trees and bushes in the college campus. The water of this reservoir is also used for sanitary purpose and in science laboratories if needed. It has also been used to decorate the facade of the college with various plants and flowering plants. We could establish a good botanical garden by using the water of this reservoir and indeed we are working on developing of well planned botanical garden in the campus. It is situated between the college building and the building of girls hostel. So, it has been protected by using the iron fence to avoid any mischief in future.
