- There is a flexibility to move from one stream to another as per University norms. Science graduate and Commerce graduate can opt for post-graduation in Arts faculty in any subject.
- Any graduate from Arts stream can pursue PG degree in several (English, Marathi, Political Science, Economics and Defence except Geography) level specializations available in the college.
- In Commerce stream, the students have 11options to pursue UG. We provide guidance for PG degree in the 'Advanced Accounting and Taxation'.
- In certain subjects, students can change subject within the same discipline at first & Second year in B.A., B.Com & B.Sc. For instance the students who want to take English as their special subject have to pass the General English Paper at FYBA level. If they have not selected General Paper English there is

- a provision take that paper next year or any student of the same subject want to change his special subject the same provision is there.
- The students from B.Sc. Computer science are eligible to take admission in regular T.Y.B.Sc. Electronic Science & Mathematics.
- Student possessing diploma in Pharmacy & any branch of Engineering are eligible to take admission in S.Y.B.Sc. as per eligibility rules of Savitribai Phule Pune University.

Aashatai Patil, Entrepreneur Mrs. Nalini Kulkarni, Orator Vinaya Kelkar, Dr. Prachi Pawar (Director of Manishankar Eye Hospital) Dr. Hemangi Sanap,

- and Shri. Amit Shrivastava (Member of Service of Society NGO) guided the students.
- 22 years Shahin Shaikh who adopted a 16 years old HIV victim was invited to spread the social message of human responsibility.
- Programs like More than 50% girl students are enrolled for the Soft Skills Development Programme, PMKVY (*Pradhan Mantri Kaushalya Vikas Yojna*) and Barclays' Skill Development Programme, Mahindra Pride Skills Development Program, *Janshikshan Sanstha*

Women's Grievances Cell

- Under this cell the problems and issues of the female students and teachers are discussed and resolved.
- The alumni of the Institute Adv. Annasaheb Sonawane was specially invited to guide girl students on the family Law against the Domestic Violence. The Girls had an opportunity of interacting with him freely in the interactive session

Inclusion:

- The Vision and Mission of the Parent organization, M.V.P. Samaj is *Baujan Hitay Bahujan Sukhay* following this mission the institute emphasizes on the inclusion of the disadvantaged sections into the mainstream. As a result more than 50% students belonging to the disadvantaged communities and sections are included in all educational aspects. Along with the students the institution takes care to fill the posts of teaching and non-teaching staff as per the Govt. norms.
- Through various capacity-building strategies students are involved in solving issues like Superstitions, Castes, Regionalism etc. that are at present affecting the society. The NCC cadets and NSS volunteers are sensitized about these issues during the camps. NSS volunteers perform street play(Beti Bacchao-Beti Paadhao)
- Celebration of Birth Anniversaries of eminent personalities such as Shivaji Maharaj, Swami Vivekananda, Savitribai Phule, Dr. Sarvapalli Radhakrishnan, Ramanujam, Dr. B. R. Ambedkar etc., also motivates the students and staff to imbibe the great qualities of these eminent personalities to develop harmonious co-existence.

Environment:

- A course in Environmental Awareness course is conducted for the second year UG students of all the faculties
- The NSS Unit focuses on cleanliness and tree plantation in the campus and the adopted villages- Sonambe, Dubere and Manegoan respectively
- The staff members also participated in tree-plantation

- NSS Volunteers perform street play, 'Swaccha Bharat-Swastha Bharat' on the theme cleanliness and hygiene to develop awareness in the society
- In the Botanical Garden of the institute the students have planted and nurtured varieties of saplings
- Solar Energy Plant (7 KW) of the Department of Physics is well equipped with new instruments. The generated electricity is utilized for the daily work of administration office, some classrooms and laboratories.
- Environmental Awareness Rallies are organized on issues like Environmental Pollution, Campaigns like 'Save-Water', Environmental Day (5th June) and World Water Day on 22nd March were celebrated.
- Dustbins/Litter-bins are kept at strategically located places within the Institute campus.

- MADHAVA Mathematics Competition: Every year the Department of Mathematics conducts a MADHAVA Mathematics Competition (MM) for the students, under the guidance of the Department of Mathematics, Savitribai Phule Pune University

- Savitribai Phule Pune University has implemented the Choice base Credit System for all Post-Graduate courses from June 2013. The evaluation system of PG is followed according to the university instructions.







- Term-end examinations are conducted by the Institution as per the university schedule.

B. Evaluation Reformation at P.G. level

- Reformation of Choice Based Credit system
- The continuous internal evaluation through Written Test, Seminar Presentation, Assignments, Open Book Tests, and Group Discussion
- Introduction of Additional Credit System

For evaluation of U.G. and P.G. level, pre-printed stickers are provided by the university which are bar-coded.

- For the first year course of all disciplines the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune has given the whole responsibility to the concerned Institutes for Examination, Evaluation and Declaration of result from academic year 2011-12.
- The institute follows the 80:20 patterns for UG courses including Arts and Commerce faculties.
- The institute follows the Choice Based Credit System for all PG courses.

Based on these norms the Internal, Oral, Practical and External Examinations are conducted by the Institute. More than this the students are evaluated by Group Discussions, Oral Exams and Seminars. The affiliating University adopts various evaluation reforms as listed below:

- Online registration for the examination
- Implementation of Bar Code System
- Use of online question paper at the time of examination
- Photo copy of evaluated answer book is also provided on demand
- Revaluation of Answer Sheet
- Internal assessment and term end exams
- Objective/Multiple choice questions in question paper

The Institute has initiated various reforms concerning evaluation viz

- Internal Assessment of the students as per University Criteria
- Oral Tests and Seminars are conducted to evaluate the performance of the students
- Evaluation through Projects, Journals, Field Work, Practical, Oral Test, Seminars

Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune notices the information regarding the revised ordinance related to revaluation of their answer books of the theory papers of University examination, subject to certain conditions.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The Institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University in following ways:

- Being affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University the institute strictly follows evaluation norms and guidelines of the University
- The Institute is a center of the university examination of SSPU. The institute also conducts the examination of External students of the Savitribai Phule Pune University
- The Institute Examination Committee looks after the smooth conduct of the examinations with the instructions of CEO
- The Institute releases the Staff on time for university duties related to, evaluation (CAP), conduction of examination (Junior and Senior Supervision), vigilance (Flying Squad)
- The Institute conducts evaluation of First year UG level through CAP
- The provision of revaluation and photocopy of answer sheet is available on the demand of the students. The Institute is bound to give the result within 10 days from the date of the application of the student
- A meeting is called by the Principal to inform the newly appointed staff about smooth conduct of examination
- The administrative staff of office is trained to handle ICT resources carefully while feeling the examination reports filling online
- The Institute provides power generator to avoid electricity cut-off during examination time

- The Institute provides all necessary infrastructure for conducting practices and theoretical examinations including the online exam for B.Sc. Computer Science students
- The CEO co-ordinates all the matters pertaining to examination

Thus the Institute ensures the communication and effective implementation of evaluation reforms to the students and parents.



- The College is managed by Local Managing Committee (LMC) that oversees the Utilization of available allocation.
- The realization of anticipated income as well as actual expenditure is monitored. Provisions in the Annual Budget for Computer procurement and maintenance and upkeep of campus Infrastructure are provided.

4.4.2 What are the Institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- Every year the institution prepares and submits financial requirement under various budget heads to our Mother Institute. The Management Committee scrutinizes the budget and gives approval after satisfactory explanations. The college LMC plays a monitoring role on the expenditure under various budgetary heads.
- The Mother Institute appoints Engineer and Estate Supervisor for looking into issues related to the maintenance.
- The Mother Institute appoints one technician for maintenance of hardware and software of IT Infrastructure.
- Regular Electric maintenance by labour rate based technician appointed in the Institute.
- Colour and patching of the college premises is undertaken on labour rate.
- Furniture is repaired by the carpenters on labour rate base.
- Technicians are called for repairs of LCD, computers, laboratory equipment and apparatuses.

• The college has appointed Laboratory Assistance and attendants to clean the laboratory.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

- All the instruments/equipments in the laboratories are well maintained and standard operation procedures are followed whenever used. Regular maintenance of instruments is also done through department funding. Before procuring instrument the Internal Committee makes a visit to the laboratory and assesses the need of procuring the instrument and then recommends it for purchase.
- For minor instrument calibrations are done every day just before using the instrument. The process followed for calibration is as per standard methods.







• NSS

Since 1974 NSS unit has been functioning in the institute. Last 5 years 250 volunteers were enrolled. Various regular activities like cleaning college premises, celebration of various days, events, *Yuva Saptah*, Blood Donation Camp are undertaken. 125 volunteers attend special camp in the village adopted by the institute for three years. • NCC

NCC Boys' unit has been functioning from establishment of the institute. During last five years 110 cadets have been enrolled. 1. Management and Administration





Part B is to be filled up by the Head of the Department. Finally the Principal gives his assessment remarks and forwards it to the mother institution.
- **Student Feedback:** The College has a mechanism of performance assessment of the faculty. The feedback on performance of faculty is sought from students at the end of the academic year. The feedback forms are analysed and information is used for improvement of the faculty and framing the policies.

- M.V.P. Samaj Employees Credit Co-operative Society: All permanent employees of M.V.P. Samaj are members of this co-operative society. The members are covered under group and accidental insurance. The member employees are eligible to draw a lent amount up to 12 lakhs without any mortgage.
- Nasik District College Teacher Co-operative Society: The college employees are members of this cooperative society. The members are covered under group and accident insurance. The member employee are eligible to draw a lend amount up to 12 lakhs without any hypothecation.
- **Group Insurance Scheme:** 75% of permanent staff are the members of the scheme.
- **Group Medi-claim:** 80 % of the staff are the member of group Medi-claim policy.
- **Medical Check-up:** 50 % get the benefit of medical check-up free of cost.
- **Medical bill Reimbursement:** Approximately 2% staff get benefits of the scheme.
- **Medical Leave Facility:** 60 % member are benefited under this scheme.
- Concessions: 60 % staff get benefits in concession in admission fees to the wards of teaching and non-teaching staff.

The institution has formulated a Purchase Committee. The committee follows strictly pre state procedure in respect of every purchase.

All financial collections (fees and funding) are deposited in nationalized bank and all expenditure incurred (recurring and non-recurring) are executed through bank cheques.

The institution accounts are audited every financial year and reports are forwarded to the mother institute.

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes,

We have conducted Green Audit by the International Agency, Ashwamedh Engineers and Consultant Co-operative Society Ltd, Nashik. We are trying our best for maintaining the campus Environment friendly. There are about 65 types of indigenous species of ornamental and medicinal, wild plant species like *Azadirachata indica*, *Erythrina indica*, *Callistemon lanceolatus*, *Anthocephalus kadamba*, *Pongamia Pinnata*, *Dilonex regia*, *Encalyptus lanceolatus* to maintain an Eco-friendly Green campus.

As per the findings of Green Audit:

- Inculcation of **3R** (Reuse, Renew, Recycle) by the way of Rain Water Harvesting, Organic Waste Management is done so as to provide a good bio-fertilizer for plants.
- Well-developed artificial pond eco-system with varieties of Flora and Fauna. Aquatic flora consist of phytoplanktons algae like *spirogyra*, *Chara*, *Nitella* and Angiospermic plants like Hydrilla, Typha etc. as well as aquatic fauna includes Leeches, some Molluscan animals like *Indoplanorbis exustus*, *Lyminia*; some arthropods like Crabs, aquatic insects like Water scatter etc.
- We also have best organic waste management system through Vermicomposting unit. It includes canteen waste, Staff quarter waste and Ladies Hostel waste, solid wastes generated by plants is used for Vermicomposting.
- Photo-Voltaic Cells (Solar Energy) unit is installed in the campus as an alternative renewable source of energy, by which it is possible to minimize the electricity bill.
 The campus also has Solar Water Heater System for the Girls Hostel and Staff quarters.
- Use of ICT resources: Partial Paperless Office by communicating with the sources like E-mails, SMS, *Whatsapp*.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college has taken several initiatives to make the campus eco-friendly. The details are as follows:

Energy Conservation:

- Solar System having capacity 10 KVA.
- Solar Water Heating System in Girls Hostel and Staff quarters.
- Institute is equipped with LED lights.
- Institute uses 5 star rating branded electric equipments for energy saving.

Use of Renewable Energy:

- Installment of Solar Water Heating System in Girls Hostel and Staff quarters.
- Institute having Solar System. With the help of it electricity is provided to The Principal's Cabin, Administrative offices, Commerce Department, English Department, IQAC, Staff Common Room, Exam Department.

Water Conservation:

The Institute has developed Ecosystem of the 'Pond Water.' It's capacity is approximately 24,00,000 liters as per the Cubic X Liter Method. The survey has been conducted in-house by the Department of Geography.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:

- Institute has observed 'No Car Day' to sensitize students about use of fuel along with that Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Limited.
- Parking lots are located close to the entrance of the college.
- We organize 'No Car Day' since 2014 to avoid the air and noise pollution on 22nd September.
- The carbon emission test is conducted on vehicles of staff and students by staff and students of ITI students.
- We create biodiversity Awareness among the students through display of related pictures of birds and animal.
- We frequently collect the ball pens thrown by students in the campus.
- For Carbon Neutrality, the institute has protected the campus by developing green belt of tall trees in between the highway and the Main Building.

Plantation:

- Use of drip irrigation system for watering.
- Plants are protected for Eco-friendly Climate.
- Staff and students are taking initiative during 'Vanmahostav' from 01st July up to 07th July, the program run by Department of Forestry and Environment, Government of Maharashtra.
- NSS and NCC units run 'Tree Plantation and Augmentation Program' (*Zade Lava*, *Zade Jagava*) in the campus and adopted villages.
- Savitribai Phule Pune University has introduced a course entitled as 'Environmental Awareness' in the curriculum of Second Year of Bachelor Degree. The institute follows it according the guidelines of the University. It helps students to become aware of Environmental issues.

SECTION 1: PREFACE

The N.D.M.V.P. Samaj's GMD Arts, B.W. Commerce and Science college run by Nashik District Maratha Vidhya Prasarak Samaj, Nashik, located at Sinnar — Maharashtra 422 103, volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council prepared the preliminary self-study report. The self-study report was submitted to NAAC by the college, in March 2003. A peer team was constituted by the council to visit the institution and validate the self-study report. The peer team consisting of Prof. P.V. Arunachalam, former Vice-Chancellor, Dravidian University, Andhra Pradesh as Chairman and Prof. B. Ramachander Rao, Principal, S.R.R. Government Degree college, Karimnagar, Andhra Pradesh and Prof. M.S.K. Khokhar, Professor and Head, Department of Rural Technology and Social Development, Bilaspur, Chattisgarh as members visited the institution for two days i.e., on 21st and 22nd of Jan. 2004.

Dr. Geeta Iyengar, Academic Consultant of NAAC and Prof. M.S.K. Khokhar as Member-Convener, coordinated the programme.

The G.M.D. Arts, B.W. Commerce and Science College, Sinnar, Nashik District affiliated to the University of Pune is a rural college in a chronically drought prone region, with a campus area of 14.5 acres. It was established in June 1969 and is a grant-in-aid college, flourishing with 20 teaching departments and 03 faculties. The faculty of Commerce has 08 departments, faculty of Arts 07 departments and the faculty of Science 05 departments.

The college offers all together 24 programme options of which 20 are undergraduate and 04 are postgraduate programmes. The college got UGC recognition under 2f and 12B in

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June 1974. The student enrolment in UG courses is 1744 and in PG courses, it is 176. The success rate of students in all the courses is good.

The permanent faculty strength is 36, of whom 08 are Ph.Ds, 11 are M. Phils and the rest are postgraduates. There are two temporary teachers, one a doctorate and the other a postgraduate. The number of non-teaching staff is 36, among whom 24 are on the administrative side and 12 on the technical side.

The temporal plan of the academic work is annual for Arts and Commerce courses and semester for Science courses (II year onwards) as per the regulation of the affiliating university. The unit cost of education is Rs. 8805/-.

The college has several support services like central library with good number of books and journals (books: 35000 worth Rs. 12, 66,660/-), a fairly well equipped computer laboratory with latest accessories, a health centre, hostels, printing press (common to the works of samaj), teachers housing accommodation, canteen, some welfare schemes, grievance redressal cell, vehicle parking shed and a consumer store.

The peer team carefully perused and analyzed the self-study report of the college during the visit; the team went to the various departments, verified the documents, saw the facilities and interacted with the different constituents of the college. The academic, co-curricular, extra-curricular, sports and extension facilities were visited. The peer team also interacted at length with the management(apex body as well as the local managing committee), principal, faculty, non-teaching staff, students, parents and alumni of the college. Based on the above exercise, and keeping in view the criteria identified by NAAC, the peer team has taken the value judgment. The assessment of the college under various criteria, the commendable features as well as the issues of concern are given here under.

SECTION 2: CRITERIONWISE EVALUATION

Criterion (I) Curricular Aspects

The goals and objectives of the college are being realised by the academic programmes offered. The college offers B.A., B.Com. & B.Sc. Programmes. It also offers M.A. in Marathi, Economics and Political Science in the faculty of Arts. In the faculty of Commerce the college is offering M. Com. Course. The programme options for graduate and postgraduate courses are available as per choice of the students. The students have option to study simultaneously one PG course along with one PG diploma course. The college follows the syllabi of University of Pune. The college mostly caters to the needs of students of rural areas hailing from economically backward families. The college is also running DBM and DCM courses in the same campus.

Criterion (II) Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

The admission of students into different courses of study is in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the University of Pune and the reservation policy of Government of Maharashtra. The college follows the academic calendar of the University of Pune for Teaching- Learning process, which is monitored by the Head of each department and involvement of faculty members is also taken into account. The college follows good practice by conducting remedial coaching for academically weak students. Remedial classes are held in Mathematics and also in English. The teaching plan is prepared by the faculty and monitored by heads of the departments. The students are informed about the scheme of examinations and evaluation methods through the prospectus of the college.

The teachers of the college are always encouraged to avail different schemes of the UGC to takeup Minor Research Projects, Participation in Symposia / Seminars / Workshops /

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Conferences, Orientation and Refresher courses and for that purpose they also provide financial help from their funds. The college follows the Self Appraisal method for evaluating the performance of teachers. The teachers of the college are recruited through selection committees constituted as per University/ Government rules. Seven teachers of the college have participated in national seminars/conferences. The college has also organised two workshops one in chemistry and the other in commerce. One teacher of the chemistry department went to Taiwan for post doctoral research work with a fellowship.

The performance of students is periodically evaluated through internal assessment and by conducting term-end examinations. In addition to class-room teaching the students are also motivated to participate in the departmental symposia and seminars at regular intervals.

The students are informed through academic and career counselling about their future prospects. The college has also established one placement cell with help of external professional placement agency in its campus. The college adopts modern teaching methods in class room by using over-head projectors, audio-visual aids and cassettes. The language laboratory in the department of English is used to teach good communication skills. The defence studies course in the faculty of arts is a welcome addition as it provides employment in the armed forces to hundreds of graduates.

Criterion (III) Research, Consultancy and Extension

The management of the college encourages its teachers to takeup academic development programmes, minor research projects and also motivates them to avail study leave for doing Ph.D. work. The teachers are provided seed money to pursue research activities. Four teachers are working as part time research scholars.

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The extension activities of the college are mostly carried out by NSS & NCC units of the college. They also organise Symposia, Workshops, Environment awareness, AIDS, Health & Hygiene awareness programmes. The college arranges career guidance and coaching for competitive examinations. The college has done some work in adult area of education and literacy campaign.

Criterion (IV) Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college campus has an area of 14.5 acres with buildings to accommodate various units of the college. The college has recently established a central computer laboratory for the use of the students. The infrastructure of college is maintained by the management. The college always keeps considering the infrastructural growth with the needs of its academic development. Recently the college has extended the original building providing additional infrastructure. The management of the college provides matching share for development of the infrastructure facilities.

The college library has computer facility with access to internet. The book bank facility is also available in the college and the working hours of the library are between 7.30 a.m. to 5.50 p.m. The total number of books in the library is 35000. The library works for 220 days in a year. The computer facilities are also extended to the Physics Department of the college and the maintenance of the computers is taken care of by the computer engineer.

The health centre of college functions between 10.00 a.m. to 11.00 a.m. everyday and is attended by a doctor who is an alumnus of the college. The special health check-up is also arranged on different days of a week by the specialists, as and when required.

The college provides different types of welfare schemes for the teaching and non teaching staff of the college.

- Group insurance.
- Accident help.
- 3. Loan facilities with nominal interest.

The college runs a co-operative store which is maintained on "no loss no profit" basis.

The college provides hostel accommodation to several students of the college without charging any rent. The grievance redressel cell is functioning in the college.

The college has adequate sports facilities like 400 meters running track, courts for basketball and a cricket pitch. The college has a botanical garden consisting of different species of plants including some medicinal plants. The college provides various sports facilities to be used by the public outside the college working hours.

Criterion (V) Student Support and Progression

The student community love their college. The college has earned a reputation for its regularity and discipline among the students. The pass percentage of the students of the college is 99%. The progression to employment is satisfactory. The involvement of the alumni association in the development of the college is appreciable. The alumni consist of Commissioners, Advocates, Chartered Accountants, Doctors, Engineers, Defence Persons and many of them are holding important posts in different organisations. The prospectus of the college is published yearly and it contains all important information which helps the students. The placement cell of the college is helpful in career counselling and for getting employment. The students to the extent of 98% get financial help by way of scholarships and freeships from the Government. The college encourages the students to take small projects of research nature, although this is not a part of their syllabus. The recreational facilities for the students are available in the college.

Criterion (VI) Organisation and Management

The college is being run by the Samaj, a registered society under registration act, in general and by local management committee in particular. The Local Managing Committee (LMC) is the policy making body for day to day administration. The LMC is constituted as per Pune University act. The Principal is the chief executive of the college administration with the help of different sub-committees. The members of LMC include teaching staff as well as non-teaching staff besides others. They participate in policy making decisions. This way the whole administration is democratised and decentralised.

The teachers are recruited under the provisions of the act and ordinances of the University of Pune. The Non-teaching staff is recruited as per the rules of the State Government.

The college has internal coordinating mechanism to check work efficiency of teaching and non-teaching staff. The academic calendar is prepared by a committee. The college organised workshop to train non-teaching staff in handling computerised office work.

The credit co-operative society formed by members of teaching and non-teaching staff is noteworthy. The confidential reports of the faculty and other staff are maintained by the college and are used at the time of their promotion. The Self-Appraisal reports of the teaching staff is also taken into consideration for their career-advancement or for their placement in the Senior Scales/ Selection Grade / Reader designation. The implementation of the revised pay scales to the teaching and non teaching staff is an important achievement of the college. The college prepares yearly budget for day-to-day working and to check expenditure through the internal audit system which is effectively working.

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Criterion (VII) Healthy Practices

A committee is constituted for internal quality check-up. It has Su-Sanskar Committee to impart value based education to students. The college inculcates responsibilities amongst the students by involving them in NCC, NSS programmes, fund raising campaign during natural calamities, blood donation camps etc. The management of the college is geared up to achieve its goals by motivating the teachers, staff, parents and students. The college is also promoting general transferable skills among students. It is worth mentioning that the college does not charge any rent for providing hostel accommodation for the students. The college is also not charging tuition fees from the students coming from families below poverty line.

The college conducts internal test and organises guest lectures for upgrading the knowledge base of the students.

The internal relationship between the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college is also noteworthy and the college management takes special care in granting advances to its employees for specific purposes. It is important to note that college implements "earning while learning" for needy and deserving students.

The college celebrates every year the Samaj Day (August 19) which is a mega event when teachers are honoured, students are felicitated and sports persons are encouraged.

SECTION 3: OVERALL ANALYSIS

The peer team, after going through the self-study report and after its visit to various academic and physical facilities, is impressed by the progress of the college which is living up to the motto of the parent society i.e., NDMVP Samaj, "Bahujana Hitaya Bahujana Sukhaya". The college derives its support and strength from the Samaj, which has the vast network of educational centers across Nashik District. It consists of about 288 branches, with

1,70,000 students, 6200 employees and budget exceeding Rs. 115 Crores. It earned the appreciation from the Government of Maharashtra for its performance.

The college is considered to be one of the developed ones with adequate infrastructure and competent faculty in Sinnar Tahasil. It serves educational needs of the area with a cluster of more than 100 villages and hamlets.

The Arts faculty offers Marathi, English, Economics, Politics, Geography, and Defence studies as special subjects at the degree level and History and English at general level. Marathi, Economics and Political Science are offered at the postgraduate level along with commerce. The commerce faculty also offers B.Com (special) in three subjects. Science faculty offers Chemistry, Physics and Zoology as special subjects, Botany and Mathematics as general. The support services cover Gymkhana, N.S.S., N.C.C. and Teacher's housing accommodation to mention a few.

Majority of the students of the college are poor hailing from the families of Bidi workers, small farmers, and nomadic tribes and so on.

The peer team considers that there are a number of features of the college worth commending. A few of them are:

- Encouragement and support given by the management, which is financially sound.
- > The college offers few short-term computer courses, which are self-financing.
- The college has good interpersonal relationships among teaching and non-teaching staff, students and management.
- The college gives advances against their salaries to the members of teaching and non-teaching staff in the event of emergencies.
- The college implements earn and learn scheme for the benefit of needy and deserving students.

- A credit cooperative society functions in the college and extends loan facility to its members.
- The college encourages the students to take up minor projects, though they do not form part of their syllabus.
- The college has done good work in its extension activities. Mention must be made massive tree plantation by the students and staff in spite of scarcity of water.
- All most all the classes are being taught by full time faculty.
- One teacher from the department of chemistry had gone to Taiwan to do postdoctoral research work for a couple of years.
- > The teachers housing accommodation is a special feature on the campus.
- > The Sericulture laboratory merits a mention.
- One student has participated in Republic Day parade. The students of the college have also won the trophies/awards/prizes at national /state/university level competitions. The college enjoys abundant goodwill of the alumni and the community around.
- Good number of teachers attended Refresher courses, Orientation courses, Seminars and Workshops during the last five years.
- During the last five years the faculty have published some books/research papers/articles.

Keeping in view the future growth of the college, the peer team would suggest the following:

- A formal mechanism need to be put in to operation for obtaining feedback from academic peers and employers on the teaching programmes.
- The college has to promote industry-neighbourhood networking.
- Research activity needs to be promoted and strengthened.

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- The faculty may be encouraged to take up more major/minor research projects.
- The N.C.C. cadets may be trained to get selection more often in republic day parade at New Delhi.
- A cell may be constituted to give continuously effective and result oriented coaching to the students to do well in competitive examination.
- The library service needs to be further strengthened.
- Eventhough there is an employment cell and a placement officer, few students seemed to have been helped in respect of employment/placement. The activities of the cell may be strengthened and made more effective.
- The management may construct an auditorium with modern facilities to organise seminars/ meetings/cultural programmes and such other activities of the college.
- The NCC unit for girls may also be created.

The peer team is of the opinion that this exercise will be useful to the college to initiate quality enhancement strategies leading towards further growth.

- · Mini auditorium and new library building may be constructed.
- Existing language lab may be strengthened with full time trainer and also with additional equipments.
- Use of ICT teaching learning may be enhanced apart from offering bridge courses for slow learners.


